Medieval/Reformation Church History and Historical Theology HT 12

Course Description

This is a three hour course which considers Christian doctrine as expressed in the history of Christianity. The second of the three major periods of church history and historical theology is considered in this course. This course considers the life of Augustine and the major developments in the area of the application of salvation flowing from the epochal of that church father through the Medieval and Reformation periods beginning in the 5th century and continuing into the 17th century.

Educational Objectives

By means of the assigned reading, class discussion, course lectures, several exams, and a list of response questions to the reading the student will be able to understand and identify the major doctrinal and historical developments in early church history.

Course work will be considered incomplete until each of these responsibilities is completed.
